This template can be used for multiple purposes:

• It enables schools to effectively plan their use of the Primary PE and sport premium

 It helps schools to meet the requirements (as set out in guidance) to publish information on their Primary PE and sport premium

 It will be an effective document to support Ofsted inspections enabling schools to evidence progress in Physical Education (PE) and evidence swimming attainment, which forms part of the PE National Curriculum. We would recommend schools consider the Intent, Implementation and Impact of any spend, as examined within the Education Inspection Framework.

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need.

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of the PE, School Sport and Physical Activity (PESSPA) they offer. This means that you should use

they offer. This means that you should use the Primary PE and sport premium to:

- Build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years
- Develop or add to the PESSPA activities that your school already offers.

Although completing this template is not a requirement for schools, schools are required to publish details of how they spend this funding. Schools must also outline what the impact this funding has had on pupils' PE and sport participation and attainment and how any spending will be sustainable in the future. **All funding must be spent by 31st July 2024.** 

The Department for Education has worked closely with the Association for Physical Education (afPE) and the Youth Sport Trust (YST) to develop this template and encourages schools to use it. This template is an effective way of meeting the reporting requirements of the Primary PE and sport premium.

#### Review of last year's spend and key achievements (2022/2023)

Support the less active children through targeted afterschool clubs.	Although this did happen there are still a number of pupils who did not attend an afterschool throughout the 2022/23 academic year who we believe would have benefitted.	Additional fund may need to be set aside from the Sports Premium to offer additional support to parents to allow their child to attend afterschool clubs as this was one of the reasons why some parents said they did not send their children to a club.
Introduce new sports	Through afterschool clubs this was achieved. As a result, a number of children have begun participating in new sports outside of school.	Could this process be made even better through the use of parent and pupil voice?
New PE equipment purchased	Although new equipment was ordered, some of it was mistreated and needs to be replaced again.	Teachers need to ensure they are following the rules set out. E.g. teachers are responsible to getting the equipment out and putting it back in the PE shed, not the children.

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		Breakfast club and wrap around care need to ensure they are monitoring the pupils use of PE equipment as this is where some of the PE equipment is being damaged.
RB Gym CPD	This was successful this year and teachers collectively stated that they are more confident and better equipped to teach the activities which they received CPD for.	Reduce CPD from 2 days per week to 1 day per week due to costs. This will allow new staff to still receive CPD but the additional funds can be used elsewhere to continue to develop the PE curriculum.
Themed days	This did happen and was successful on these days, but I think there could be more themed days throughout the year.	Spend time planning out an a timetable for visitors to come into school and support our pupils. Can we find a wider range of athletes to come into school to ensure pupils see a wider range of role models.
Sandwell School Games	This was successful for the pupils that did go and the pupil voice from these children was really positive.	I would like us to go on more competitions throughout the year. I would also like teachers to prepare better for these days by holding clubs or training sessions on the lead up to the competition. Can we order sports kits that can be worn on these days?

### **Swimming Data**

Meeting National Curriculum requirements for swimming and water safety.

Priority should always be given to ensuring that pupils can perform safe self-rescue even if they do not fully meet the first two requirements of the National Curriculum programme of study

Question	Stats:	Further context Relative to local challenges
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25 metres?	83%	Some of the children who joined our school late missed had not been swimming at their previous school and therefore have not had the opportunity to swim.
What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort can use a range of strokes effectively [for example, front crawl, backstroke, and breaststroke]?	74%	Even though 83% of our children could swim the 25m required distance, it was only possible using the front crawl. They did attempt to use other swimming strokes but were unable to complete the distance using the correct technique.

What percentage of your current Year 6 cohort are able to perform safe self-rescue in different water-based situations?	96%	All children who were in attendance during our swimming lessons were able to perform safe self-rescue. The small percentage who could not were children who joined us throughout our Year 6 year, therefore they did not attend our swimming lessons.

Have you done this?	No	We have has a small number of children join the school late so they were not able to attend all of (if any) swimming lessons during their time with us in Year 6. This has meant that we have not been able to provide them with the time they need to improve their swimming skills.
Have you provided CPD to improve the knowledge and confidence of staff to be able to teach swimming and water safety?	No	The teaching of swimming is currently done by the specialist swimming coaches at Sandwell Aquatic Centre. During these sessions the teaching of Water Safety forms a part of the lessons. However, teachers have been provided with additional resources such as those provided by the RNLI to teach additional water safety lessons in class.
